PakAID undertook emergency response of Winterized Kits for Affected people of Mansehra, Murree and Abbottabad. PakAID mainly focuses on rapid humanitarian interventions and long term development Programmes to build self-sustained and resilient communities' hence enabling people live their life with dignity and grace.

Besides emergency response, Year 2021 witnessed us working on long term development Programmes in core thematic areas of WASH & Economic Empowerment and Integrated Development Initiatives. Our seasonal support programme enables us to share the Blessings of Islamic festivities with the poorest segment of our society. "Ramadan Food Pack Distribution" and "Qurbani Programme" not only brought smiles on the faces of neglected communities but also ease their sufferings during these Islamic occasions and contribute to address the malnutrition issues.

We strongly believe that we can lead to positive change in the society only through dedication, commitment, selflessness while working for downtrodden communities with participatory approach. Our strong M&E mechanism enables our team to monitor the long lasting impact of project interventions and assure quality of services for target communities and make ways to sustainable development and uplifting of the marginalized families.

I acknowledge the efforts of my team on the completion of three years of services in Pakistan since December 2019. I would like to thank our institutional and corporate donors for their trust, support and lending hands to reach the unreached, and special thanks to our Trustees for sharing their vision, continuous guidance, support and facilitation for effective execution of our Programmes.



Executive Summary

Pakistan has been one of the most vulnerable countries in terms of its economic crises, political instability, and poverty. These factors have multiplier effects on the people of Pakistan since many of them do not have stable incomes and measures must be taken to overcome those. Moreover, the 17 SDGs identified by the UN must also be achieved before 2030 to take Pakistan out of crisis. For these and many more reasons, PakAID has been and will be doing its part to bring about this change.

PakAID has been doing works for the betterment of the society and Pakistan overall in various ways. It is an immense pleasure to say that we delivered humanitarian assistance, worth GBP 1.5 million in 2020-21 reaching 213,018 people in Pakistan. Our outreach areas were Khyber Pakhtunkhwa, Punjab, Baluchistan, Sindh, Gilgit Baltistan & Azad Jammu & Kashmir. We covered a total of 45 districts where we implemented 12 projects with 6,606 interventions overall.

Specifically PakAID's Emergency response has benefitted a total of 5,705 individuals in terms of providing them with shelter homes and Masajid. Totally 156 interventions were done in this specific thematic area.

In the WASH sector, around 55,000 beneficiaries were benefited from 2495 interventions done this year. These interventions include hand pumps, water wells, dug wells, solar water wells and filtration plants. WASH has been the core working area in which our team has been actively involved and continues to deliver their best in every big and small project.

Like the previous years this year also PakAID actively participated in extending its Religious Dues towards the society's vulnerable and marginalized during Ramadan and Eid al Adha. PakAID provided relief this Ramadan by distributing 3,140 Ramadan Food Packs in major districts benefiting almost around 22,000 people. In the Qurbani Programme 2020, around 2,742 families i.e. almost 19,200 individuals were benefited through the distribution of fresh meat packs whereas in this year's Qurbani Programme PakAID reached out to approximately 34,500 families i.e. almost 109,200 individuals in all the major districts of Pakistan including Azad Jammu and Kashmir.

Last but not the least; PakAID has intervened in the sector of Education where it aims to restructure 5 schools in the district of Southern Punjab. It is expected that by the end of the annual year 2022, more than 1000 students would have been benefited with the interventions PakAID has planned with JICA. This will have a multiplier effect on the student and society. And PakAID hopes that the Education program will also spread to the nearby villages of Southern Punjab and parts of Pakistan in near future.

With all these projects done, we hope that in the annual year 2021-22, we will have done more projects, will have reached out to more people and will play a bigger role in making Pakistan a better country to live in.

PakAID has worked hard to establish and legally get registered with the EAD in order to meet all requirements set by the government of Pakistan. We ensured that both the country and UK (headquarter) office were in line with guidelines and had shared the vision, mission and values through a programme of alignment and dissemination. Our work was focused on practicing transparency across the organization with measurable KPIs.

2. To develop a robust and flexible organizational infrastructure

PakAID made great gait in updating its policies and procedures including its staff handbook guidelines and renewing its status with National and International Humanitarian Code of Conduct and Standards. Revised performance appraisal processes were introduced and staff was trained accordingly. Programme and Project development took place and rolled out further.

3. To further develop our Programmes Department

The departments were restructured and streamlined for a better performance and to meet the needs of our developing Programmes and Projects. Fit for purpose policies, processes and manuals were developed, however, the size of the department still needs to expand to meet delivery expectations. PakAID, UK Programmes were implemented with a variety of activities and a more focused approach was developed.

4. To develop research partnerships for developmental work

The strategic advocacy skills of our Programmes and Project Management team enabled us to advance and implement the humanitarian services in the most remote areas of the country and to develop partnership with organizations like JICA.



Emergency Response

Summary

PakAID's goal was to supply, to the most vulnerable families in Pakistan especially women and children, enough winter supplies including bedding and warm clothing. The impact of this provision was to reduce the suffering caused by the harsh winters and protect them from illnesses minimizing their health issues. A total 1092 beneficiaries were facilitated through 156 interventions in 4 districts of Khyber Pakhtunkhwa and Punjab Provinces, Graph-1.1


Impacts of the Programme

Majority of the economically vulnerable people in Pakistan do not have essential NFI's to cope with the harsh and chill weather in the winters. The current pandemic has severely affected the daily wage labourers and other small household businesses entrepreneurs especially widows and orphans, but through our Emergency Response Programme; Provision of Winterized kits; those who were economically vulnerable had quilts and blankets at the start of the winter season. With this the number of people getting affected by seasonal illnesses was greatly reduced and health improved generally.










Summary

Shelter or your own house gives you a sense of security and being safe. It protects you from the severe hot or cold weather conditions and other social evils. We realize that it is often difficult for women with children, who have lost their husbands, to feed their family as well as keep their house in good condition. PakAID supports vulnerable families with dignity and care. We protect widows, orphans and homeless by providing shelter houses; own house gives you a sense of security and safety. We are empowering women, and working to give children a brighter, happier future. Therefore, PakAID constructed 132 houses and facilitated 1005 beneficiaries. (Graph-1.2)

Impacts of Program Shelter:



We empowered the marginalized women and orphan children through building shelter homes to give children a brighter, safer and happier future.




Graph-1.2: Construction of 132 Shelters/Houses in Punjab for Beneficiaries

Masajid:

Mosques are the centre of any community where people can congregate for their five daily prayers and Friday congregation sermons. A mosque serves as a place where Muslims can come together not only for prayers, but for information, education and meetings. Since the areas we worked in were remote they did not have access to even building a Masjid for them. PakAID went to their assistance and successfully built 24 Masajid of medium and large levels and benefited 4700 individuals (graph 1.3) in different communities so the people can pray and perform their religious dues. 


Graph-1.3: Construction of 24 Masajid in Punjab and Khyber Pakhtunkhwa for 4700 Beneficiaries




PakAID successfully provide improvement in access to clean drinking water through the installation and construction of hand pumps (2082, graph-2.1), Indus hand pumps (22, graph-2.2), water wells (359, graph-2.3), solar water wells (2, graph-2.4), Dug Wells (24, graph-2.5) and water filtration plants (6, graph-2.6) in major districts of Pakistan; having a positive impact on the community's education, health, economics, and women empowerment. 
Graph-2.1: Construction of 2,082 Hand pumps in Khyber Pakhtunkhwa & Punjab for 14,574 Beneficiaries






Graph-2.3: Construction of 359 Water Wells in Khyber Pakhtunkhwa & Punjab for 25,130 Beneficiaries

Impacts of Programme

Based on our multiple visits to the region, we believe that the key to pulling the villagers out of generational poverty is to provide them with clean drinking water. This has enabled the villagers to succeed in other areas of their lives such as education and economic freedom. The biggest benefit of having a these WASH interventions is that they provides clean drinking water that does not have any contaminants. This has drastically reduced the chance for the villagers to contact any water-related diseases. These projects have a profound impact on local communities which are as follows:

- No Manual Labor Open Dug Wells require villagers to pull the water for up to hundreds of yards before the bucket of water reaches the surface. The time spent pulling on the manual labor hinders villagers from doing other life-essential tasks such as growing crops or going to school. With solar well, all that's required to retrieve water is to twist a knob. It's that simple. Each Solar Well comes with taps to allow for multiple villagers to get clean drinking water at once. No ropes or pulleys required.
- 2. <u>Water That Lasts:</u> Solar Wells are closed systems that use electrical energy to pull water from deep within the ground. Because there is electrical energy, rather than manual labor, the motor is able to pull water much faster and deeper than it could be pulled through a rope and bucket. This allows the Solar Wells to last an estimated 25 years.
- 3. <u>Contamination Free Water:</u> Open Dug Wells are open from the top (no lid), which leaves them exposed to contaminants such as dirt and livestock. It's very common for livestock to fall into the wells overnight thus fully contaminating the water supply until the dead animal is retrieved from the well and the well is flushed out. Solar wells are closed for the top, preventing contaminations.
- 4. <u>Improve Personal Health:</u> The project has improved the health status of the community in the targeted localities and reduced the level of illnesses and deaths caused by waterborne diseases like typhoid, worms, cholera, dysentery, and diarrhea.
- 5. <u>Access to Education</u>: Availability of clean water has enabled women and children to attend school more attentively as now they do not have to focus on access to clean drinking water and come to class hydrated and ready to learn. This will lead to an increased literacy rate and social development.
- 6. <u>Prosperity for Women</u>: Since now women do not have to spend the whole day carrying water for miles, they get ample time to do other productive household and social activities, find more time to care for their families, expand minimal farming to sustainable levels, and even run small businesses thus bringing women one step closer to economic freedom.
- 7. Enhance Productivity and Reduction in Poverty: One of the greatest causes of poverty in developing countries like Pakistan is the lack of access to clean drinking water. The lack of water is an often insurmountable obstacle to helping oneself. Food can't be grown, houses can't be built, a healthy lifestyle can't maintained, education is not possible and hence it is almost impossible to do any productive work. Without clean water, the possibility of breaking out of the cycle of poverty is incredibly slim. When a water solution is put into place, sustainable agriculture is possible. Children get back to school instead of collecting dirty water all day, or being sick from waterborne illnesses. Parents find more time to care for their families, expand minimal farming to sustainable levels, and even run small businesses; hence communities are freed to begin working themselves out of poverty.



Religious Dues (Ramadan & Qurbani)




Summary

Ramadan Food Packs: This Ramadan, PakAID provided food parcels containing essential items such as oil, flour, lentils and dates to families in need. The needy Families reached out across Pakistan are mostly those of the widows, orphans, elderly, daily wages laborers and small farmers. The Ramadan food baskets allowed them to be better prepared for the month of Ramadan, easing their worries about where their next meal would come from. A total of 3140 food packages were distributed in Kyber Pakhtunkhwa, Baluchistan, Punjab and Islamabad Capital Territory by covering 14 districts and benefiting 21,980 individuals. 




Qurbani Programme: PakAID team reached out to the needy and delivered them meat packs in a respectful way. Sacrificial animals were purchased from local suppliers in order to benefit the local economy and slaughtered according to Sharia. Fresh meat was packed and then distributed among the needy and deserving families at different locations all across the country. Each meat packet contained on average of 2.5 to 3 kilograms of meat, which provided a family of 7 with meals for about a week. In qurbani program-2020, a total of 19,200 individuals were directly benefited (graph-3.2) and in Qurbani program-2021, a total of 109,200 individuals were directly benefited




Graph-3.2: Qurbani Programme-2020 for 19,200 beneficiaries in Khyber Pakhtunkhwa & Sindh






Graph-3.4: Qurbani Programme-2021 for 54,320 beneficiaries in Punjab




Graph-3.5: Qurbani Programme-2021 for 25,900 beneficiaries in Khyber Pakhtunkhwa

Impacts of Program

1. Ramadan Food Packs provided food security for thousands of families in need across Pakistan during Ramadan. Already struggling to survive, their needs are accentuated during this blessed month when they might not have even basic foodstuffs for suhoor and iftar. Our support enabled the poorest and most vulnerable to share the blessings of this precious month by having sufficient nutrition and by not having to worry about opening or closing their daily fast with. The deprived and helpless people stormed to our distribution points in hope to get something to feed their families.

This project enabled us to provide 3,140 food baskets, this Ramadan, in different villages of Pakistan. In this project, 3,140 families i.e. 21,980 individuals (Annex-3) have been blessed in the holy month of Ramadan. List of food items annex-4

2. Qurbani is a sacrifice that is offered at the time of Eid al-Adha to show gratitude towards Allah and to provide for the poor and needy. Keeping the original spirit of Qurbani fi SabilAllah in due consideration, PakAID Pakistan commemorated this Islamic ritual with traditional zeal and enthusiasm. Those who received the Qurbani meat included widowed women, orphaned children, refugees and poor, elderly or disabled people. For the majority of these people, meat is not part of their regular diet. The Qurbani meat allows some families to eat meat after a whole year. When families receive Qurbani meat, it fostered a real sense of hope for them and allowed them to celebrate this important occasion along with millions of other Muslims across the world. In 2020, almost 2,742 families i.e. for a family of 7 on an average almost 19,200 individuals were benefited where as in 2021; almost 34,500 families i.e. for a family for 7 on an average almost 109,200 individuals were benefited from this project. Innovative Works:

Healthcare

PakAID has taken the initiative of establishing a Mobile Health Unit where it will provide free of cost health care facilities to children, women, men, and the elderly. Since the marginalized and deprived communities either do not have means to afford medical facilities or are far away from their living area making convince a huge hindrance is obtaining health care. Thus, this Mobile Health Unit will have all the basic and necessary equipment from medicines to medical equipment to treat the people with good care. There will be well-trained, highly educated doctors appointed in the Mobile Health Unit to deal and treat the patients. A special arrangement will be made for appointing a female doctor since most of the women in the village would not be comfortable with a male doctor.


Having done their treatment right, they will be able to earn a livelihood for which they might have to leave their village. Other than this, generally, the overall the percentage of healthy people will increase in the village.

Education


PakAID has adopted 5 schools in the Southern Punjab region and is constantly working for its face lift and up gradation. As of year 2021, PakAID has done a gap analysis where it identified the existing loopholes in the schools. It has also identified that renovation of schools is of utmost importance as it develops interest of the students as well as teachers. Moreover, PakAID is working to provide the students with the basic school supplies like furniture, uniform, stationery, and books. For the teachers, we are having training programs in order to fully equip them with skills they need in order to teach children in classroom setting. Other than this, we are revisiting their academics and working on strategies to make children study in a fun and friendly environment.

PakAID has also been involved in facilitating the teachers and staff in monetary terms. And thus, we have created jobs for the underprivileged through these measures. Hence, they do not have to leave their homes in order to work. This has facilitated them enough since their travel and living expense is saved which was previously not an option.


In light of these measures, PakAID, to have an immense intervention in the South Punjab Village of Kot Addu, for the betterment of people have been in contact with other stakeholders of Education. We have signed joint agreements with other stakeholders and are working closely for the uplift and renovation of schools and villages in general. These measures will not only help the students in their long term but also that the teachers will benefit. This will also create a general impact on the villagers and help to overcome the taboo attached to education and specifically education for females. In the long term, this will bring about wellbeing and uplift of the village at large. It is a slow process but when it's done, the benefits it will sprout are countless. Currently there are 45 teachers including 34 female teachers and 11 male teachers are getting directly benefited from PakAID education intervention (Graph-4.1). A total of 1075 students including girls and boys are continuing their education in 5 schools supported by PakAID along with 9 support staff (Graph-4.2 & 4.3). Details are in Annex-6.

Orphanage

PakAID realizes that orphans may not have their parents with them but they need to have guardians who provides for their basic needs in life. Thus, to the orphans in orphanages of Ehsanpur, Kot Addu and Jatoi, Muzaffargarh PakAID is their guardian.

PakAid is currently overlooking these orphanages in the region of Southern Punjab. Specifically it is working on the Education, both Quranic and Mainstream school education, of 200 orphans. Along with this, PakAID is providing for their food, clothing and shelter which are the constitutional rights of every child in Pakistan.

While providing for these, we loved the children's enthusiasm as they had a feeling of security and affection with all the basic necessities being provided to them.

Sultan Muhammad resident of Attock feels greatly indebted to the philanthropic service of making available the water well in their vicinity. Being the representative voice from Village Parri, Sultan praised the efforts of the entire team of PakAID and its partners for reaching out and self-sponsoring the availability of the water well. PakAID was responsive and started building a 2 bedroom house for her. When the keys were handed over to her she and her children were overjoyed with tears of happiness in their eyes and said "I don't have words to explain how relieved and happy I am feeling seeing this very own house of mine. Now I don't have any fears of getting homeless like before." In the end she thanked PakAID for doing so much for her in such a short period of time.


